All Grade 5 WRCA students are reading at or above grade level.








Provincial Graduation Assessments



With growing participation and strong performances across all levels, our Badminton Warriors are quickly becoming a force to be reckoned with.



































PROGRAM UPDATES Service TRANSFORMATIONAL LEARNING, LOCALLY AND BEYOND

Uganda

This year's Transformational Learning Opportunity (TLO) trip to Uganda (March 8-18, 2025) offered students an immersive experience focused on cultural understanding and community engagement. Hosted by Jeff and Shannon Dyck in partnership with Kuwasha—a respected organization in Kibaale, the birthplace of the AIDS epidemic — 20 Senior School students, along with chaperones Joel Slofstra, Nolan Medel, and Tolu Pauls, stayed at Kuwasha's guest house and participated in meaningful, hands-on activities.

Students engaged with children at the school and community center, visited their homes and families, and several even met their sponsor children. A highlight was building a mud hut for a local family, deepening students' appreciation for the community's resilience. With limited access to electricity, Wi-Fi, and fresh water, students gained powerful insights into everyday life in the region. The trip concluded with a reflective safari experience.











Mexico

The TLO trip to Mazatlán, Mexico (March 8-18, 2025), gave students the chance to serve through Youth With a Mission (YWAM). Twenty Senior School students, chaperoned by Anthony Bigornia, Gerry Goertzen, and Phoebe Lo, stayed in YWAM campus dorms and participated in worship and faith-building alongside staff and students.

One major project involved building a home through the 'Homes of Hope' ministry for a young couple—the wife just 17 years old—a deeply impactful experience. Many students used power tools for the first time, with both boys and girls embracing the challenge and learning new skills. Strong bonds formed across Grades 10, 11, and 12 as distinctions faded and teamwork flourished, fostering resilience, adaptability, and a heart for service.

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Local Service

This year's Local Service Week (March 10-14) transformed a historically low-attendance period into a meaningful, community-centered initiative for students who remained on campus. Approximately 100 students from Grades 10 to 12 participated. Under the leadership of Biblical Foundations Coordinator Laura Lee, partnerships were built with over 25 local organizations—including churches, food banks, shelters, and refugee services—enabling students to serve in small, consistent teams from Monday to Thursday.

This extended engagement allowed students to build relationships, better understand local needs, and gain practical insight into nonprofit work. Complex transportation logistics were coordinated with the help of teachers, staff, and parent drivers.

The week concluded with a reflective gathering at White Rock Baptist Church, where students shared experiences and discussed insights shaped by Bible class discussions and the book When Helping Hurts. A communal meal from a food truck capped off the week with fellowship and gratitude.

















Still Waters, Deep Lessons

Twenty-seven of our Grade 9 students took part in a transformative outdoor learning experience from May 12-14, 2025. A highlight was the chance to connect with peers from Duncan Christian School and engage in meaningful conversations with Indigenous elders from the Cowichan First Nation. These interactions offered powerful insight into Indigenous history and culture, helping students deepen their understanding of Truth and Reconciliation as an expression of their Christian faith.

Evenings around the campfire provided a meaningful rhythm to each day. Through singing, storytelling, and reflection, students shared openly about what they were learning and experiencing. These times fostered a sense of community and created space for spiritual and emotional growth. A moment none will forget occurred when a pod of orcas surfaced just meters from the students' canoe. This awe-inspiring encounter with creation left a deep impression, reminding everyone of God's presence and the beauty that surrounds us when we take time to slow down and be present.

This TLO experience nurtured students academically, socially, and spiritually. They returned with new friendships, a broader worldview, and a deeper appreciation for community, creation, and faith in action.




COMMUNITY UPDATES From Grad to Alumni: Two WRCA Lifers
