HEAD OF SCHOOL MESSAGE

Citizenship

MR. JOEL SLOFSTRA



What does it mean to be a citizen? Our Core Purpose states that we will inspire and cultivate citizens of Godly character who transform their world for Christ. But what does citizenship entail?

Charles Handy once wrote, "Citizenship is the chance to make a difference in the place you belong." Citizenship begins with belonging. Just as a passport shows that you belong to a nation or a jersey identifies you with a team, our students' first and truest identity is as members of God's Kingdom. In Canada, citizenship grants rights and freedoms. In Christ, we are given something far deeper: freedom that is rooted in grace. Galatians 5:1 reminds us, *"It is for freedom that Christ has set us free."*

At WRCA, we want every student to know they belong, they are loved, and they are free to grow, not because of their performance, but because of God's grace.

Citizenship, however, is not passive. It comes with both privileges and responsibilities. In earthly nations, that might mean voting, following laws, or serving the community. In the Kingdom of God, it means discipleship, which includes showing compassion, seeking justice, serving others, and living with integrity. At WRCA, this takes shape through daily rhythms of prayer and Scripture, through acts of kindness woven into school life, and through students learning to take ownership of their choices. True citizenship is not about behaviour modification. It is about heart transformation.

Citizenship also carries purpose. It is not simply about belonging to a community; it is about contributing to it. Jesus calls us to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world (Matthew 5:13-16). We are to bring flavour, goodness, and illumination to the places where we live, learn, and serve. Our students are discovering that freedom and responsibility are not personal privileges but opportunities to transform their communities for Christ. This is what it means to be a citizen of Godly character.

Ultimately, all earthly citizenship points to a greater reality, which is our citizenship in heaven. Philippians 3:20 declares, "But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ." That belonging shapes our identity, and identity shapes action.

We want every WRCA student to be able to say with confidence: *"I know who I am. I know whose I am. And I know I belong."* We want them to live as citizens of God's Kingdom, rooted in grace, growing in character, and transforming their world for Christ.



SCHOOL THEME

Belonging

Each year, we select a core value, a scripture passage, and a theme, all of which are related and enable faith formation, pedagogic innovation, and cultural engagement as a Christian community. Our school themes typically rotate through Compelled, Liberated, Engaged, Anchored, and Refined.

This year, our theme is **Belonging**. Our theme verse is rooted in Romans 12:5:



"So in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others."

This verse reminds us that belonging is not simply about fitting in or finding friends; it is about identity in Christ. We belong first to Him, and through Him we belong to one another. Paul's words to the Roman church affirm that each member has value, purpose, and dignity, and that life in Christ is lived in relationship, not in isolation. We chose this verse because it ties directly to our desire for every student to be known, valued, and connected both socially and spiritually. Belonging in Christ provides the foundation for building authentic relationships, supporting one another through challenges, and growing together as one body.

The theme of belonging weaves into chapel, homeroom and Student Spiritual Retreats (SSRs), giving students repeated opportunities to explore and experience it. In chapel, speakers throughout the year are reflecting on what it means to belong in Christ, drawing on the themes of Romans 12 such as unity, service, humility, and love. Our SSRs at Timberline (Grades 6 to 8) and Rockridge (Grades 9 to 12) centered on belonging (as will Camp 4/5 in June 2026), with intentional homeroom activities designed to launch each grade into the year with a strong sense of connection.

New This Year: Senior School Homerooms

Starting this year, WRCA has introduced a new homeroom structure across the Senior School. Every student in Grades 6 to 12 is now part of a homeroom with both a teacher and a co-teacher. The presence of two adults creates stability and ensures that every student has at least one caring adult who knows them well. These teachers will plan fun activities, create a space where students feel heard, and guide prayer time together. Homerooms provide a consistent place of connection, a classroom that students can call their own, where they can eat lunch, ask questions, and gather with a familiar community.



In addition to this regular rhythm, homerooms meet weekly around chapel time for twenty minutes. This time may be used before chapel to prepare hearts, pray, and reflect on expectations, or after chapel to debrief, apply learning, and connect spiritually.

The homeroom model replaces what we previously called CREW. In many ways, it is a more intentional version of CREW, designed to ensure students are known, supported, and spiritually engaged. It is our hope that these rhythms will build a culture where students experience the security and significance of being known and valued within a smaller community inside the wider school - a place to belong.

Enrollment

WRCA's strong sense of belonging and Christ-centered community continues to be a defining strength. This year, 627 students call WRCA home, a number that reflects our commitment to maintaining a school size where every student is truly known, supported, and valued.

With a physical cap of 670 students, we continue to see steady interest from families who seek not only a place where their children can grow in faith but also experience a globally recognized, well-rounded education while having fun! We are thankful for the great-fit families who join our community and contribute to its warmth, creativity, and shared vision.



As we look ahead, WRCA remains dedicated to inspiring spiritual growth, providing a high-quality education that prepares students for the future, and nurturing a deep sense of belonging where each child can thrive.

Junior School Chapel: We Belong

At White Rock Christian Academy, Mrs. Kirkley (Jr School Bible Teacher), Mrs. Eckert (Jr School Music Teacher), Mr. Goertzen (guitar) and Mr. Barker (piano and voice) have contributed to making our Junior School chapels a place where students encounter the living Word of God in ways that are relevant, relational, and rooted in revelation. Each Wednesday morning, our Grade JK-5 students gather to sing, pray, and hear stories that connect directly to their lives. Chapel is more than a program; it's a rhythm of worship and wonder where children discover that they are known and loved by God. This year's theme, "Belonging," invites students to understand belonging through God's story. From September's reminder that "God knows my name" (Isaiah 43:1) to June's promise that "nothing can separate us from His love" (Romans 8:38-39), every message helps students find their identity in Christ and their place in His family.

Each month explores a different dimension of belonging:

- We Belong to God – discovering identity and being made in His image.
- We Belong in Community – learning friendship, forgiveness, and encouragement.
- We Belong Because God Chooses Us – seeing how God calls and includes everyone, from David to Zacchaeus.
- We Belong in God's Big Story – tracing His promises from Abraham to Jesus.
- We Belong by the Holy Spirit – understanding our gifts and unity in the Body of Christ.

Through music, storytelling, Scripture, Star Students and student participation, chapel becomes a sacred space where faith takes root in young hearts. As the year unfolds, our students come to know that belonging isn't something we earn; it's a gift from the God who created, redeemed, and calls us His own.

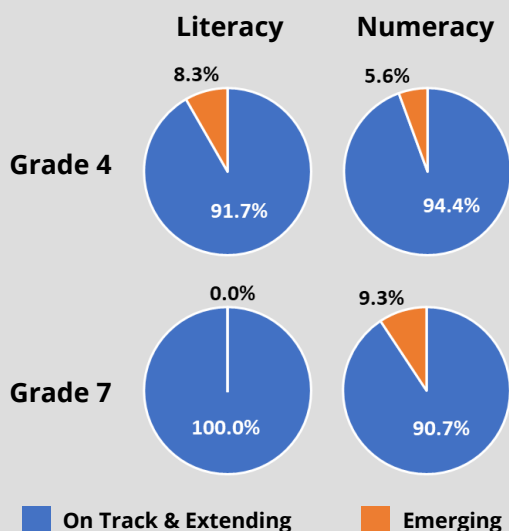

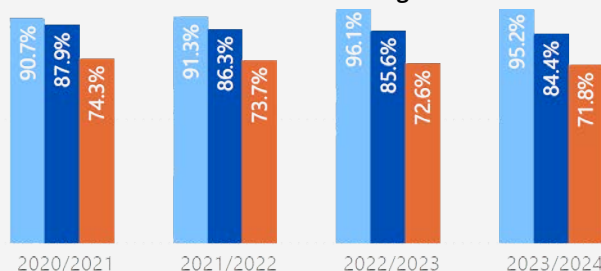

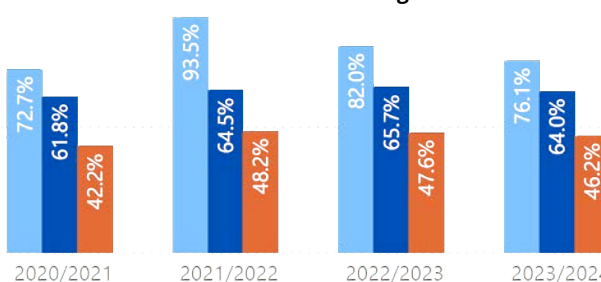

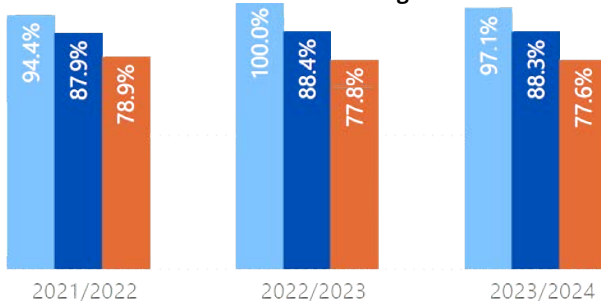
Grade 10 Literacy Proficient and Extending Rate



Grade 10 Numeracy Proficient and Extending Rate



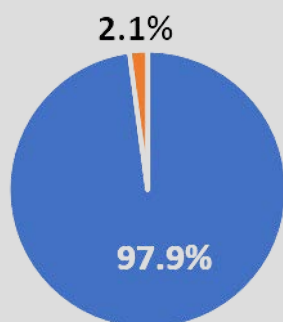
Grade 12 Literacy Proficient and Extending Rate

Results: IB Diploma Program



IB Diploma Success: 25 of 26 diploma candidates earned the prestigious IB Diploma. In order to earn the IB Diploma, students must score 24 points (out of a maximum of 45). Our diploma candidates averaged 34 points. Seven students scored over 40 and one student earned our highest total ever – 43!

TRANSFORMATIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES



For the 2025–2026 school year, our Transformational Learning Opportunities are designed to help students grow through service, cultural engagement, and spiritual development. Each experience encourages students to put their faith into action and gain a deeper understanding of the world around them.

During Service Week, Grade 10–12 students may travel to Chukyo, Japan to experience Japanese culture through homestays, school exchanges, and outreach with a local church. Guided reflection encourages students to consider how relationship-based service supports the growth of the Christian church in Japan. Another option is serving with Youth With A Mission (YWAM) in Mazatlán, Mexico, where students will help build a home for a family in need, participate in community outreach ministries, and learn about global mission and gap-year opportunities. Students who remain local will serve in our own community through activities such as supporting retirement homes, soup kitchens, animal shelters, and delivering care packages to people experiencing homelessness, demonstrating the importance of loving our neighbours close to home.

In addition, all Grade 9 students will participate in a learning experience in Duncan, BC focused on truth and reconciliation. Through guided cultural tours, land-based learning with a Cowichan elder, canoeing, storytelling, and a traditional salmon barbecue, students will deepen their understanding of Indigenous knowledge and history. Prior to the trip, students will complete the KAIROS Blanket Exercise to prepare for meaningful engagement. Together, these opportunities challenge students to grow in compassion, cultural awareness, and service-minded leadership both locally and globally.

WRCA generated a total revenue of approximately \$13.49 million in 2024-25, up from \$12.97 million in 2023-24, and \$11.89 million in 2022-23. Fiscal year 2024-25 ended on June 30, 2025.

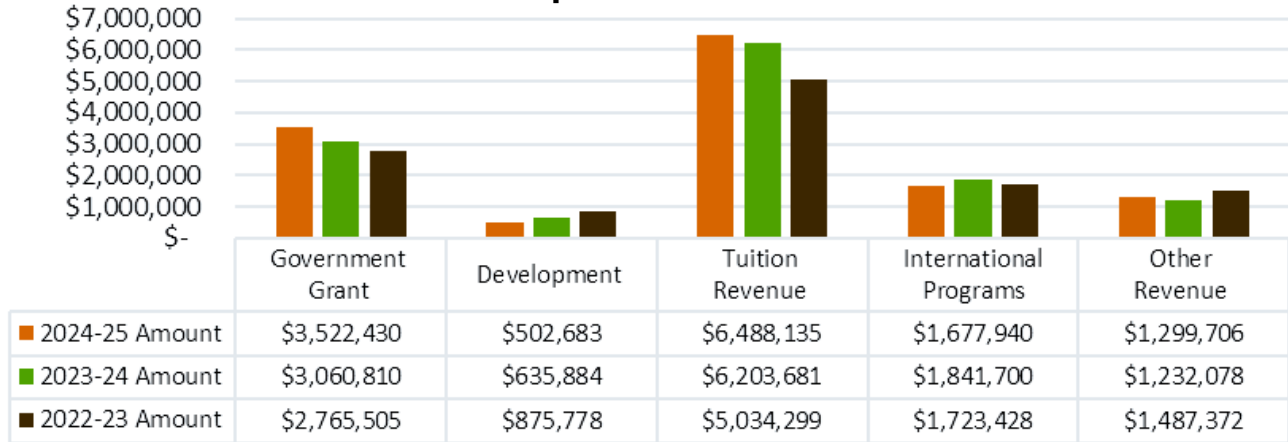

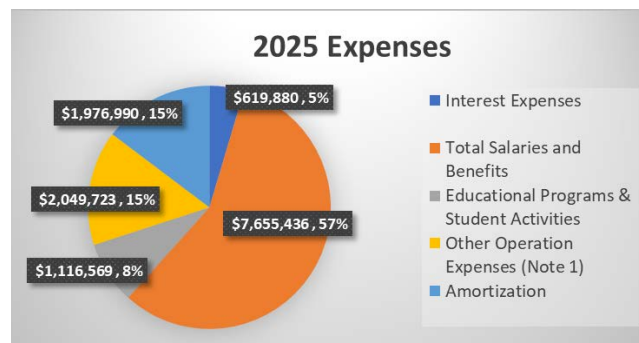

Capital Assets and Debt

Capital assets totaled \$24.93 million as of June 30, 2025. The main addition to capital asset this year is the playfield, which was completed in April 2025.

- Land: \$5.6 million
- Building and Building components: \$15.4 million
- Playfield: \$3.1 million
- Others (equipment, vehicles, etc.): \$0.83 million

As of June 30, 2025, WRCA has outstanding loan of \$18.1 million, with \$1,021,500 loan principal repayment, and \$619,880 interest payment during the fiscal year.

Development and Fundraising

Last year, the Development department raised \$502,683 from our generous WRCA community through private donors and fundraising initiatives, including Annual Drive, Gala, and Corporate Partnerships.

On the shoulders of many generous donors spanning decades of commitment to our vision, we were able to launch the Better Together Campaign. This Campaign is all about belonging and partnership in a beautiful God-honoring story.

Why “Better Together”?

With all my heart, I believe God has created each one of us with unique gifts to partner with Him for His glory as we tell His story. Better Together reflects our belief that when each person brings their piece, whether through prayer, service, or financial partnership, something extraordinary happens. Together, we are building more than a school; we are building a community that inspires and cultivates citizens of godly character who will transform their world for Christ. This is kingdom work!



As a visual reminder of how we are Better Together and a picture of our \$1.2 million target to pay off the field, we are building a 1,200-piece puzzle.
